Personally appeared before me the undersigned Justice of the Peace of Saratoga in said County William Chadwick who being duly sworn deposes and says in addition to the declaration made aforesaid that he has no documentary evidence to establish his claim to a pension and knows of no person whose testimony he can produce who can testify to his service.

That he claims a Pension only for six months service in the Massachusetts State Troops which service he rendered as stated in the annexed Declaration.

On this ~~eighteenth~~^{twenty} day of September in the year One Thousand eight hundred and thirty two personally appeared in open Court before the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas of the ~~State~~ County of Lewis now sitting William Madwick a resident of the Town of Louisville in the County of Lewis and State of New York aged Twenty years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress Passed June 7. 1832. — That he entered the Service of the United States under the following named Officers and served as herein stated.

In the year 1778. in the month of February he enlisted as a volunteer under Captain John Stanford in the Massachusetts State Troops for nine months that at the time he enlisted he was ordered to be ready at a minutes warning but was not called for under about two months from that time; when they were called for and ordered to White Plains New York. — When he arrived at ~~White~~ Fish Kill New York he was met by a Regular officer and the company was ordered to stop at Fish Kill to guard the Military Stores at that place — that he remained at Fish Kill until his term of Service had expired and he was discharged about the first of November of that year making between six ~~and~~ seven months actual Service

That he has no Documentary ~~with~~ evidence and no knowers of no person whose testimony he can procure who can testify to his Service

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a Pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the Pension
