A letter to Mrs. Guy Thompson from Miss Eva Gregg, manager of the Isabella Fisher Hospital of the M. E. Mission at Tienstein, China acknowledges receipt of the boxes and packages of goods collected here and sent in Miss Gregg's care for China famine sufferers relief. In addition a letter of length accompanied it which we will be pleased to print in our next issue. There were also several kodak pictures included.

Miss Eva Gregg formerly of our city, but who has been away for several years doing missionary work in China, was in the city over the week end, the guest of her friend Mrs. Guy Thompson and while here was pretty eviaccorded several very dences of her friends' appreciation and admiration. More desired to show her honor, but her brief stay in our city prevented all of these and only the very closest of her old home friends were favored with opportunities to show her deference. On Sunday evening Miss Gregg gave addresses talking on conditions in China and her work and the church was packed to hear her. Her talk was all too brief, as all could have remained there indefinitely and been entertained by the wonderful stories she had to recount. Miss Gregg left later for the south part of the state where she is booked to deliver her talks in some of the bigger cities.

A JAPANESE EARTHOUAKE Miss Eva Gregg, a former Cheboygan girl and who was back to the old home town last year for a visit after spending several years as a medical missionary in China, can now add to her very wonderful list of experiences that of living through an earthquake, one that became world famous. Of tremors are of freslight course. quent occurrence on some sections of the Pacific coast of our own country. but one of the big shows that make the whole world set up and take notice is not of common occurrence. The last big event of this kind was the second great quake that rocked the Japs in their little island kingdom. The first was one of the most startling calamities of the age, but the second one occurred some time after and although this was of fair proportions it did not equal the big one of last year. Miss Gregg was on her way back to her work in China by steamer and their boat was laying in the harbor at Yokohama, Japan and Miss Gregg was asleep in her stateroom when the second quake rocked that port and that part of the island. None on board the boat felt the shock but they witnessed the effect of the earth tremor the next morning. Miss Gregg wrote this information to Mrs. V. A. Baker a Petoskey lady friend while aboard the boat, she says also the reports about Japan are not exaggerated. They couldn't be. It is awful.
