Dear Madam:

Because I had no form of discharge of sufficient capacity to accommodate the names of all the parties, I have typewritten a discharge of the Ray G. Hill and Cora W. Hill mortgage, to be executed by the four mortgagees.

A new law, which became effective last January, requires all the signatures to all instruments recorded in the Register's office to be either printed or typewritten beneath the signatures.

Therefore, each signer should sign her name in full, as set out in the body of the discharge, each above the typewritten name.


When all the signatures are properly signed, witnessed and acknowledged, the discharge should be sent to the Stockbridge State Bank, with instructions to deliver it when the amount unpaid on the mortgage has been paid in to your credit.

I suggest that Mrs. Black and Mrs. Delamarter sign and acknowledge this discharge first, signing where their typewritten names appear, and then send it to Mrs. Vansyckel and Mrs. Grubaugh, for their signatures, witnessing and acknowledgement.

It may be well to send this letter to the parties at Armada, for their guidance.

In ~~the~~ the mortgage, Mrs. VanSyckel's name is given as Ada M. VanSyckel, and in the deed to Mr. and Mrs. Hill her name is given as Ada N. VanSyckel. I presume it will be well to follow her name as given in the mortgage, Ada M. VanSyckel.
