Myra Castner, influential principal in Campbell schools

As a risk-taker, Myra Castner didn't just talk about getting parents involved in the education of their children.

When she was principal of Hazelwood Elementary School, she set up a nerve center for parents in the Campbell Union district. called it the VIP Room, and challenged mothers and fathers to live up to the Very Important "Parent title.

"She took some money to hire a parent to work in there," said Connie Elness, her successor as Hazelwood principal. "It became a resource library for parents all over the district, where they could find books and magazines and get help with problems.

Although she was principal at Hazelwood for only three years. its parents thought so much of her that they renamed the school's library the Myra H. Castner Library when she retired in 1991.

She was the originator of the annual Asilomar Reading Conference and the Young Authors' Fair of Santa Clara County.

She also was principal at Moorpark and Marshall Lane schools and taught at Sherman Oaks and Capri schools.

Mrs. Castner grew up in Grosse Pointe, Mich., and graduated from the University of Michigan. She followed that with a master's degree from the University of Utah, where the family lived when her husband, Tom, took a job with Lockheed. He staved with the missiles and space company for 30 years. The family moved to San Jose in 1967.

For her daughters, Mrs. Cast-Mrs. Castner worked in the ner was "our best friend," said Sarah Castner, an assistant attorney general for the state of Oregon. "She gave motherhood and her work and her career more

than 100 percent. In my mind she was the epitome of the career woman. She did it all."

Her daughter Meg is a environmental and safety representative for Hewlett-Packard.

After she retired, Mrs. Castner became a travel agent.

In February, she and her husband and their longtime friends Darryl and Sandy Sawyer had gone to Utah for a vacation hiking in the snow at an elder hostel. After suffering a seizure Feb. 26 in Moab, the following day she went to an emergency clinic in Bountiful, where she suffered a second seizure and died.

When friends gather to say goodbye Saturday, said friend Kathy Tuttle, they will participate in a service in thanksgiving for the life of Mrs. Castner - as expressed by her school secretary, Char Silva: "Myra's gift was her ability to bring out the best in everyone else and make them so proud of the job they could do."
