The community sorrowed to hear of the sudden death of Miss Jennie Hayden when it was learned she had passed away following an operation Friday for appendicitis. All was done for her that human skill could do, but nothing availed, and in the early hours of the Sabbath her spirit took its flight.

The funeral services were held Tuesday at the M. E. church which was filled to its fullest capacity. The school children met at the high school, and marched in a body to the church. The pulpit was banked with beautiful floral pieces and the casket covered with roses and carnations, fitting testimony of the high esteem in which she was held by all who knew her. The services were in charge of Rev. Sayers, her pastor, assisted by Rev. Karr. Beautiful music was furnished by Mrs. J. Holiday, Miss Lesla Bailey, Edgar Reid and Ben Ketchum, with Mrs. G. Kinch at the organ; and all that was mortal was laid away in Wildwood, amid a bower of flowers.

The services at both church and grave were very impressive, and there was scarcely a dry eye in the house.

Jennie, only child of Mr. and Mrs. Addison Hayden, was born in Chesaning, Jan. 7, 1896, and was taken from this life, March 26, 1911. Her life was a continual testimony of her beautiful character, her love for home, and school, and the pure life within, always displaying a desire to be good and do good. She was an excellent student in the 9th grade of the high school, and always prided herself on having a high standing.

She was formerly a member of the Lyceum class; and later a devoted attendant at the Episcopal Sunday School. Hers was a sunny, happy nature, and she endeared herself to all her friends. The bereaved parents, who are nearly heart broken, have the sympathy of the entire community in their great loss. But her faith in a life beyond has taught them to mourn "not as one without hope."
